Commodore's Corner

It's certainly hot today (105 degrees) as I am writing this article as it has been the last two weeks. The record heat has been the predominant weather factor for the last 2 weeks in our area of North Alabama, but with the record heat has come good afternoon breezes due to the heating of the land in relation to the temperature of the water. The water temperature in Wilson Lake is now above 90 degrees. At the ocean, this warming of the land in relation to the cooler ocean temperature is known as the "sea breeze" and inland where lakes predominant it is also known as a "lake breeze." So, if you can stand it, get out there just take plenty of fluids with you and drink often. Hopefully we will get a cold front for the upcoming Vice Commodore's Regatta and Dixie Scott Challenge Series this Friday, August 24th through Sunday, August 26th at MSSC. VC Regatta and Dixie Scot Challenge Series

So far we have nine (9) Scots participating, five (5) Thistles and four (4) of our club lasers preparing to race. I suspect we will have several more boats enter later this week. Privateer is sending no less than three (3) boats, including skipper's who finished 2nd, 5th and 8th in the Challenger Division of the 2007 Flying Scot North American Championship. What a challenge this will be for Muscle Shoals sailors to race against some of the best sailors in our class. As this is a centerboard only event, Muscle Shoals sailors need to reserve a club boat if they don't own one or volunteer to be someone's crew in a Daysailer. All four (4) of the club lasers are reserved, including three (3) of them from skippers from Wheeler. We still have three (3) more unreserved Club 420's and two (2) Sunfishes. I know several members also have lasers and Gar, who is the Principal Race Officer, has also indicated he will make his laser available should anyone want to use it. This is going to be a great regatta and a substantial number of boats on the starting line.

Grass Invasion

Recently, and for what reason we do not know, a floating grass plant invaded our harbor. It had completely choked off the docks closest to the mouth of the harbor (D dock). The grass had also started to invade other areas of the harbor. We believed, at first glance, the grass was Asian milfoil, *myriophyllum heterophyllun*, but after the Board got out there and looked at it, we think that it is more likely to be either southern widgeon grass, *ruppia maritima or* southern naiad, *najas guadalupen*-

sis (a/k/a bushy pond weed). Regardless of whether it is widgeon grass, bushy pondweed or milfoil, it was still very invasive and had completely clogged and choked off some of the slips. Some of it is still present, but the Board spent two (2) hours raking it up and getting it "out to sea" per our conversation with the state biologist. Our week of infestation began the first part of August 2007. The weeds were substantially present in eastern portion of the lake.

Where did the weeds come from? I don't think it is naturally growing from our inlet or from the back of the slew, although it is now present and may take root from there. I think its probably coming from the Town Creek area and broke off *najas guadalu-pensis* (a/k/a bushy pond weed). Regardless of whether it is widgeon grass, bushy pondweed or milfoil, it was still very invasive and had completely clogged and choked off some of the slips. Some of it is still present, but the Board spent two (2) hours raking it up and getting it "out to sea" per our conversation with the state biologist. Our week of infestation began the first part of August 2007. The weeds were substantially present in eastern portion of the lake.


I think its probably coming from the Town Creek area and broke off and was pushed in by the southerly and westerly winds that we have been having. Once in the harbor it became trapped behind the docks. There was a lot of this weed over at my dock on the Colbert shore, but it has now been flushed out. I am hoping that the current will take it on down stream, as expected. This weed did appear last year, but not in the quantity that it has appeared this year. We will continue to monitor the situation


Finally, the Board approved putting the Minutes of the Board meeting in the Member's Only section. After minutes have been approved, they will be posted so it may lag a few months.

We use classroom and on the water instructors and expose the students to as many different types of boats as possible. This is only a basic sailing course, but, you gotta start somewhere!

Willson Jenkins and myself performed all of the classroom instruction using all the tools we had, including the projector to give visualization to what we were talking about.
